Grant Objectives



-  increase the number of ethnically-diverse, low-income families who participate in healthy activities (shopping at FFM, healthy eating, and physical activity)
-  improve participants’ knowledge of healthy food preparation and consumption, local food resources, and opportunities to participate in physical activity
-  support participants in making plans to engage in healthy practices (preparing healthy recipes, shopping at the local farmers market, and engaging in regular physical activity)

Grant Highlights

-  Served over 250 local residents
-  63% of surveyed residents were first-time shoppers or shopped at the Forsyth Farmers Market less than once a month



-  Over 30 volunteers (many were repeaters!)

-  \$475 in Bring It Home tokens to incentivize shopping at Forsyth Farmers Market
-  Over \$1630 spent with local businesses (not including Forsyth Farmers Market & bluknowledge)

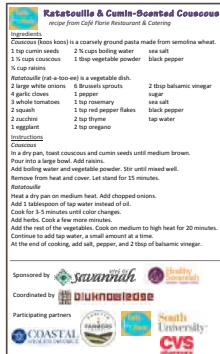
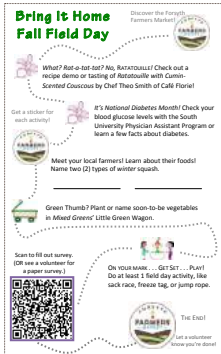
Example Nutrition Questions

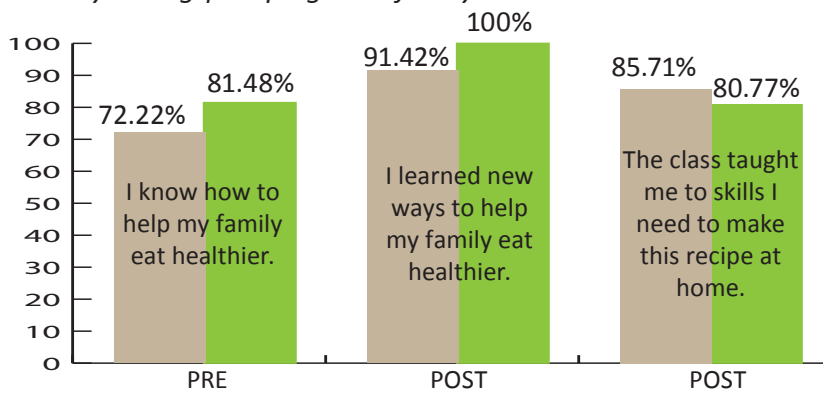

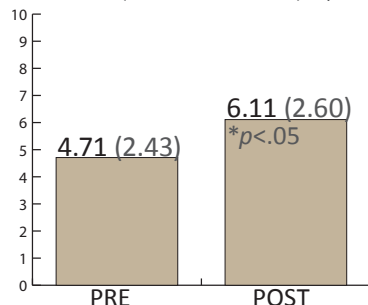

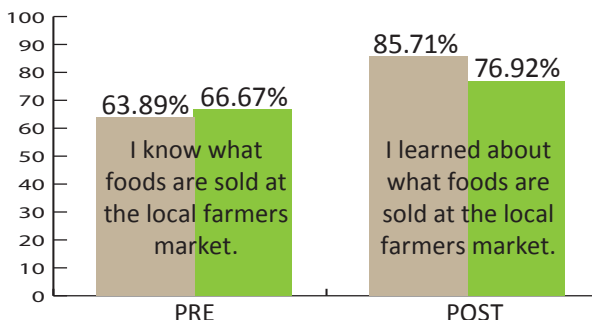


Nutritional Knowledge

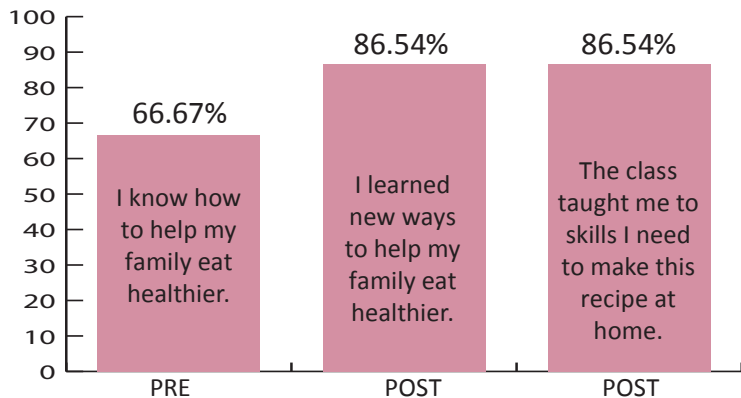

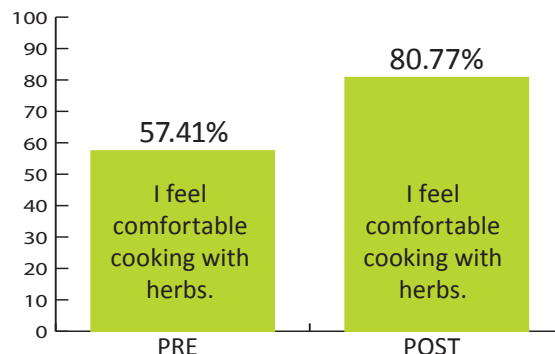

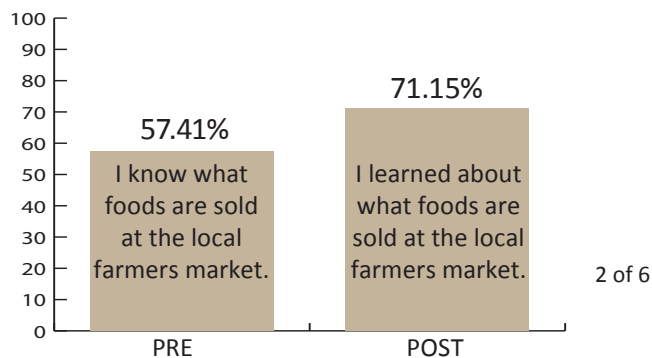

Best Practices and Lessons Learned

Consider Participants as Resources

- Tap into what they already know about healthy eating and cooking.
- Provide opportunities for participants to share their knowledge and practices with each other.
- Market Healthy Food Education classes as a way to improve upon what they are already doing to support the health of their families.

Meet People Where They Are

- Target established groups or locations with a core set of participants.
- Create materials for all ages, literacies, and abilities.
- Consider accesiblity when planning.



Connect Community Education

- Coordinate education with environmental or policy changes.
- Align with existing nutrition education and health messages (e.g., USDA My Plate).

Community Education = Community Building

- Educate volunteers.
- Build relationships.
- Create information network.
